

'NET Check: TRUSTING GOD

What does it mean to "trust" someone? Trust, according to the dictionary, is when you have confident expectations in something. There's no doubt in your mind that the person will fulfill whatever they've promised you; you're confident in their reliability and capability. So how do we apply that definition to trusting God? Trusting God and having faith in Him means that we know He will come through for us on whatever He has promised. In the Bible, we can read hundreds of promises that He has made, and He has never broken a single one. He is trustworthy. He is capable of anything. There is nothing that is impossible for our Lord—isn't that an incredible thought? Since we have complete confidence in His abilities and know that He has never broken a promise, we have no reason not to trust God entirely.

'NET Check: THE PHARISEES

We meet the Pharisees at various times during the New Testament. They were a group of religious leaders for the Jews. They were taught to obey all the commands that Moses listed in the Old Testament, and they took great pride in their obedience. However, this pride often went to their heads and they believed they were better than other Jews. They thought obeying the rules was more important than loving others and treating them well. They often got into arguments with Jesus because He taught love first and rules second. The Pharisees didn't want to believe that because it took away all their learning and self-importance, so they refused to accept He was the Son of God. Jesus called the Pharisees hypocrites on more than one occasion because of their legalistic ways. They'd pick and choose which laws they wanted to obey, and then condemn others for not obeying all the rules.

'NET Check: MARY MAGDALENE

Mary Magdalene is one of the key female followers of Jesus during His time on earth. She is considered one of His disciples. The Bible doesn't give us a history of her background and family ties, though she is widely thought to be the same woman from whom seven demons were cast out (see Luke 8:2). We can assume she wasn't married because she spent so much time following Jesus on His travels. She was present during His trial and crucifixion. She stayed even after the other disciples had scattered and waited, suffering along with Jesus, until He died. Mary Magdalene is also noted as one of the women who went to visit Jesus' tomb after He had been buried. She was the first person that Jesus appeared to after His resurrection. That would have been counter-cultural at the time, because it was such a male-dominated society. Yet Jesus chose to reveal His miraculous resurrection to a woman before His other disciples. This implies that she was a worthy disciple who truly loved the Lord with all her heart.

'NET Check: RECONCILIATION

Reconciliation is a big word. Do you know what it means? It's basically the idea that people can be on friendly terms again after some kind of rift or wrongdoing. Perhaps you and a friend got into a fight about something, or your sibling isn't speaking to you because of some issue. If you were to resolve your issues and resume your agreeable attitude with your sibling or begin hanging out with that friend again, your relationship would be reconciled. Jesus wants us to be reconciled with God. Sin is what separates us from Him. God is holy and perfect, and cannot directly be where sin is. When we choose to live sinful lives, we separate ourselves from God. But when we choose to repent of our sins and live in God's ways, then our relationship with Him has been reconciled. This reconciliation was made possible when Jesus died on the cross for our sins.



'NET Check: THE GOOD SHEPHERD

In today's passage, Jesus explained that He was like a shepherd to us, His sheep. Why does He compare Himself to a shepherd? Because, like us, sheep need a lot of guidance because they are easily led astray. They can get lost, they cannot defend themselves, and they cannot provide for themselves. In the same way, we cannot provide for ourselves either. Jesus has to supply our every need, including the air we breathe and the world we live in. He is our Protector from harm and He leads us in His righteous ways. He is trustworthy and we know His voice. There's no reason to hesitate in following His commands, or to second guess His intentions. He always has our best interests at heart.

'NET Check: NINEVEH

Nineveh was the wicked city in which Jonah did not want to prophesy. He had probably heard stories about the wrongdoings that happened there, and wanted to stay far away from it. Jonah was a Hebrew. He was set apart from the Ninevites, and perhaps he thought he was better than them. He was above them, so he couldn't possibly be bothered to go tell them about God. It was fine with him if the

Ninevites wanted to continue in their destructive, selfish ways. However, it was not fine with God. God loves everybody, and was disappointed in Jonah's reaction to the Ninevites' situation. Jonah was supposed to be His messenger, and that meant delivering messages to all of God's people, not just the ones of whom Jonah approved. Once the Ninevites heard about God's wrath, they were quick to leave their evil habits, ask for forgiveness, and participate in a city-wide fast. All they needed was the opportunity to hear about God's love and they were immediately repentant.

'NET Check: PRAYER

Prayer is very important in the daily life of a Christian. It is what keeps us in constant communication with the Father. Jesus told us that we are to be like branches on the vine, meaning that we draw our strength and life from Him. We accomplish this through prayer and spending one-on-one time with the Lord. We can tell Him our troubles, ask for guidance, give Him our prayer requests, praise Him for His blessings, and thank Him for His faithfulness. You can do it at any point of the day, anywhere. Paul even tells us that we should pray "without ceasing," meaning to never stop. There's no better way to begin the day than by waking up with God and no better way to end it than by thanking Him for the day you just had. How can you improve your prayer life this week?

'NET Check: FORGIVENESS

When we do something wrong, it's called a sin. The Bible is very clear on what actions are sinful and deserve God's punishment. Whenever we do wrong, we're supposed to apologize for our wrongful action and then ask for forgiveness. We do this with the person we've wronged, and we also do this with God. It's very important to receive forgiveness from God because His forgiveness is the only one that matters. In the Bible, we see that the punishment for sin is death. But God doesn't want any of us to die or be punished. That's why we ask for forgiveness. He wipes away our dirty sin and gives us a fresh start. Through His forgiveness, we have been cleaned and purified. Because He loves and forgives us willingly, as Christians, we should love and forgive others willingly as well.

'NET Check: COMPASSION

Compassion is when you take pity on someone who is struggling, is sick, or is hurting in some way, and you try to help them. In the story of Jonah, the prophet did not have compassion on the Ninevites. He thought they deserved to be punished and shouldn't receive a second chance. Jonah forgot that God had given him a second chance when the big fish spat him back out of the sea, and did not want to show the same mercy to the people of Nineveh. He was more concerned about himself and his own comfort. Even though Jonah was being undeserving, God still showed him further mercy and compassion by growing a tree to keep him cool in the desert heat. This is how God loves us too. When we are at our worst and lowest, He will still treat us with grace and unwavering love. Since God has been so merciful to us, we are to be merciful and compassionate toward others.



'NET Check: SAMSON

Samson was born to Manoah and his barren wife. It was considered a miracle because God made the impossible possible. Samson was raised as a Nazirite, which meant he had to follow certain rules: he couldn't cut his hair, drink alcohol, or eat certain foods. He was known for his incredible strength. But when Samson was old enough, he stopped following the restrictions. He enjoyed partying and he married a woman outside of his chosen circle. Later, he became involved with the infamous Delilah. She was working for the Israelites' enemies, the Philistines, and wanted to know the secret to his super strength. After a series of tricks, he finally confessed: his long hair. Delilah cut his hair, and the Nazirite covenant was broken. Though he had fallen off track, Samson would ultimately redeem himself before the Israelite people and God when, with his dying act, he killed a great number of the Philistine enemies.
